Course objectives:

This course aims to provide MA in Linguistics students with the necessary skills and techniques, which would allow them to carry out research in the field of linguistic studies.

They need to understand the nature of research, its types, and its characteristics. Students, by the end of this course, are supposed to become able to choose a research topic, state clearly their objectives, read the relevant literature and choose the appropriate method for their research projects. They are also supposed to master the relevant techniques of paraphrasing, quoting, and referencing necessary for the writing up of the research proposal and the final report.

Method of evaluation:

From the first weeks of the course, students are guided to gradually learn how develop their research projects, specify their research questions and methods, write up the research proposal and submit it to the teacher for evaluation by the end of the term. Seventy percent of the final mark goes for this research project. The other 30% are for different assignments such as tasks on paraphrasing, quoting and referencing.
